The predicament of unwanted animals' suffering would not exist were it not for human action, yet many people point the finger of blame on the animals themselvesthey're a blight, they're a health hazard to be "gotten rid of' (a hateful term that should never be applied to sentient beings). People boot animals out the door or move and leave them behind in a vacant house. Homelessness for animals, a predicament created by humans, comes with a high price attached-a life of deprivation, prolonged and painful—a dear price those responsible will never pay.

Though cast off and hated by segments of the human population, homeless animals manifest an unmistakable dignity; no matter what undeserved hardships befall them, their innocence remains unchanged-they do not become evil though evil reigns the world they occupy. Nothing comes to them easily, so that a stale french fry lying in the gutter is the day's only meal, a putrid puddle the only moisture calming their raging thirst, a tiny patch of dry ground under a pile of debris the only place to rest. Such is the way of the unwanted animal on the streets.

If there is a bright spot in this portrait of bleakness and pain, it is you. Only because you shake off the mantle of disregard, finding unacceptable the suffering pushed onto the innocent by other people, are we able to head back to the alleys each night. Without ever having seen the wretched places animals emerge from when they hear the alley car's engine, without having seen firsthand the effects on them of life on the streets, you still care about what they endure. Though you have never picked up off the pavement an animal dying from illness or injury, your heart breaks as surely as ours, and for this we are more than grateful. The one and only reason an old beat up alley ear winds its way through the dangerous streets each night is the extraordinarily unselfish compassion you bestow upon creatures whose pain you could so easily ignore.


